

Susan Hood is the award-winning author of many picture books for young readers, including Ada's Violin and Shaking Things Up: 14 Young Women Who Changed the World. She is the recipient of the 2017 E.B. White Honor Award, the 2017 Christopher Award, the 2017 Américas Award and the 2017 Bank Street Flora Steiglitz Straus Award, given to "a distinguished work of nonfiction that serves as an inspiration to young people."

Before launching a full-time writing career, Susan was the Children's Content Director of Nick Jr. Magazine, where she edited original stories by the winners of the Caldecott Medal, the Coretta Scott



King Book Award and the Theodor Seuss Geisel Award. Before Susan was a children's book editor at Sesame




While working as an editor, Susan wrote hundreds of children's books for ages 1-8, including board books, concept books, interactive books, nonfiction and beginning readers. 

Identify, reframe, and reproduce six core high leverage-teaching practices for language instruction based on the discussion and analysis of Enacting the Work of Language Instruction: High-Leverage Teaching Practices. (The American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages, 2017), and using LingroToGo and Contraseña as models. **Develop** a lesson unit and activities for their own language classroom. **Model** a specific practice by deconstructing the HLTP into instructional moved and listing the teaching challenges they addressed taking into consideration their instructional context, learners, and goals. **Assess** their peers and their own lesson using the TELL Project rubric for teacher effectiveness for language learning.

Instruction by University of Florida faculty

Cari Jiménez is an instructor in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese. Her research interests focus on the intersection of second language acquisition, experiential learning, and mobile learning in the L2 classroom. She specializes in classroom technology and interactive learning spaces.



Teachers will receive a certificate upon completion of assignments which they can submit to their district for proper credit. Registered UF students may be able to receive college credit.

K-12 TEACHERS' SUMMER INSTITUTE ON AFRICA JUNE 10 – 21, 2019

Hosted by the Center for African Studies University of Florida

The Center for African Studies at the University of Florida is offering a **two-week** Summer Institute for **ten** K-12 teachers. The objective of the institute is for participants to increase their knowledge about Africa, including its geography, history, and culture. Participants will develop lesson plans for use in their classrooms. Participation in the summer institute is free. In addition, participants will receive a stipend of \$700. Alachua county teachers will receive continuing education credit from the School Board. Participants are responsible for their accommodation.

International Exchange Opportunities for U.S. Teachers and K-12 Schools



INTERNATIONALIZE YOUR
TEACHING, EXCHANGE IDEAS,
BUILD RELATIONSHIPS, AND
CONNECT WITH COLLEAGUES!

The U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) sponsors a variety of exchange programs for U.S. teachers and schools. U.S. citizens who currently work primarily with students and demonstrate a commitment to a career in education and a potential for leadership may apply for these programs. Selected participants hail from a wide range of locations, backgrounds, and schools. Program lengths range from two weeks to one year in duration. Programs are administered in cooperation with leading non-profit organizations and are funded by the U.S. Department of State.

FOR K-12 TEACHERS

Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching Program: This program is open to K-12 teachers and other educators such as guidance counselors and librarians who spend at least fifty percent of their time working with students.

- Semester Program: Teachers take part in a semester (from three to sixmonths) of independent study abroad, where they complete an inquiry project, take courses for professional development, and share their expertise with teachers and students in the host country. The application period opens in late fall and closes in early winter each year. Locations may vary from year to year. - Short-term Program: Teachers serve as educational experts abroad for three to six weeks (between June and November) and provide support for specific projects identified by a host institution in participating locations. The application period generally opens in January and closes in February of the year in question. Locations may vary from year to year. Fulbright Teachers for Global Classrooms: This program is open to K-12 teachers and supports their efforts to make their students and schools globally knowledgeable and competitive. Teachers complete a graduate-level online course, participate in a two- or three-week international study abroad program in the spring or summer, and develop projects and new curricula for their home school. The application period generally opens in early winter each year and closes in March. For additional information, please visit: www.irex.org/project/teachers-global-classrooms-program-tgc

In 2017, we estimate that approximately 400 U.S. and international teachers participating in these programs reached nearly 65,000 students when they returned home. Over the course of their careers they will influence more than one million students.

HOST A MANDARIN OR ARABIC TEACHER

Teachers of Critical Languages Program: This program supports K-12 Schools with developing and existing world language programs in Mandarin and Arabic to host a fully-funded native language teacher from China, Egypt, or Morocco for one full academic year. The application period generally opens in late fall and closes in January of the following year. For additional information, please visit: **tclprogram.org.**
